

Before the town could boast its first... Northern Tribune Sept. 7, 1933 announced... of Miss Joyce Cave-Brown materialize. Grande Prairie will soon have a rental library. In discussing the proposed library with the reporter, Miss Brown said "People of Grande Prairie and district are a reading public and I believe there is an opportunity for such a library." By the press of Dec. 14, 1933 many were delighted to read the following folksy notice: "Studio Library (Opposite Town Hall) A cozy chair, a glowing hearth and a book... If you can enjoy this, why not your friends also? Let them have adventure, mystery and romance. Give them a membership in The Studio Library. It will cost you only \$1.00. That early cultural venture served in a limited, ad hoc way for a brief time, eventually inspiring the Grande Prairie branch of the Women's Institute to promote the town's first public library.

LIBRARY to Formally Open Saturday Afternoon With Serving Silver Tea

To formally open the Grande Prairie Public Library a silver tea will be held in the council room of the Town hall, Saturday afternoon, June 17, from 3 to 6. Everyone interested in this worthwhile addition to the town as well as women, are invited to attend the tea and see the progress made.

The Library committee, W.I. assisted by members of the I.O.D.E. have been busy for some time repairing, filling and indexing the books donated by local supporters. The first bookcase built by Mr. Spencer is well filled with nearly 500 volumes of fiction, non-fiction and juvenile.

During the afternoon there will be an opportunity to take out membership, which is the only charge for the privileges of the library and which is permanent. This charge is necessary to meet expenses incurred

in the establishment of this town benefit. Commencing June 21, the library will be open on Wednesday and Saturday evenings from 7 to 10. It is hoped that Grande Prairie will show its appreciation of the real work entailed in the establishment of this town benefit.

G.P. Public Library Increases Books To Meet Demand



This was a year of celebration, innovation and revitalization for the Grande Prairie Public Library.

The community helped us celebrate our 75th anniversary throughout the year, and particularly embraced the free Library memberships we offered during the month of June. We saw an 82% increase in new memberships and a 63% increase in renewed memberships.

Our celebration as a vibrant, progressive Library included the expansion of our e-resources, including new databases such as Ancestry for genealogy research, Zinio for online magazines, and Hoopla for videos, music and audiobooks. Ebooks continue to be extremely popular with our users, and our collection has expanded accordingly. In response to requests from our users for bestsellers to be more available, we introduced the Most Wanted Collection, with short-term loans and high turnover. The books and films in this collection are flying off the shelves and are clearly a hit.

Programs continue to be a key component of our service, and the creativity and innovation of our staff led to many exciting new offerings. One of the year's highlights was LibriCon, the first ever Library Comic Con. Hundreds of people – many in costume - attended this hugely successful program, which has gone on to receive two provincial awards.

This birthday year was also an opportunity to revitalize the Library, with the launch of our new technologically advanced programming space and a review of the layout of our current public areas.

As the Grande Prairie Public Library embarks on its 76th year, I would like to acknowledge the leadership of the Board, our strong ongoing relationship with the Peace Library System, the support of municipal, regional and provincial governments, the generosity of donors and volunteers, and hard-working staff.

The community of Grande Prairie prides itself on its innovative culture, and its public Library also reflects the values of creativity, excellence and innovation. These values have been woven into our Library services for 75 years and we will continue to grow and respond to the needs of our vibrant community as we enter a very bright future.

New library computer will make things e...



In 1939, the Grande Prairie Institute asked the town council for a new Library. The town and Charles Spencer, a local businessman, provided the bookcases for the Library. The Edmonton Bulletin and local newspapers had a collection of 300 books. The library opened in June.

Seventy five years and five months later, the library is located in the beautiful Morley building. The collection contains over 160,000 items including toys, DVDs, Blu-ray, eBooks and audiobooks.

A community celebration was held from 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm. The event was reminiscent of the original opening day in 1939, featuring delicious OMG Cupcakes. Guests enjoyed playing games and a photo gallery of the library's history. All those who attended were entered into a drawing to win an iPad.


